# RUSK DEFENDS VIETNAM WAR POLICY



WASHINGTON (UPI) Secretary of State Rusk yesterday said he was encouraged by progress toward peace in South Vietnam, but there was no indication of Hanoi negotiations.

He warned the communist world that any doubts about the U.S. determination to honor its commitment in Southeast Asia could lead to World War III. Rusk replied to critics of the administration with an uncompromising defense of the Vienna war policy. He said there was no significant body of American opinion asking for a withdrawal from Vietnam nor serious opinion which desired a general war. He said Hanoi should not misunderstand the debate on the war. Rusk said the U.S. commitment to Vietnam war is clear.

He warned the communist world that any doubts about the U.S. determination to honor its commitment in Southeast Asia could lead to World War III. Rusk replied to critics of the administration with an uncompromising defense of the Vienna war policy. He said there was no significant body of American opinion asking for a withdrawal from Vietnam nor serious opinion which desired a general war. He said Hanoi should not misunderstand the debate on the war. Rusk said the U.S. commitment to Vietnam war is clear.

## SURPRISE AIR TACTICS

SAIGON (UPI) An Air Force official said that North Vietnamese pilots are using a new target system that enables them to surprise American jets from behind and fire missiles. U.S. officials said 102 Americans were killed last week in Vietnam. 26 were missing and 890 wounded in the lowest casual figure in two months.

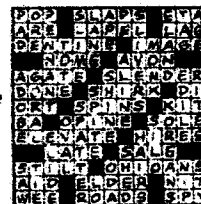
**CROSSWORD PUZZLE**

#### GIL HODGES HIRED AS METS' NEW MANAGER

With the recent 1967 World Series, baseball fans have been focusing on two teams. However, some of the other teams have been busy even though they are not playing baseball. The lowly New York Mets (10th place N.L. finishers in 1967) yesterday hired Gil Hodges as manager for the 1968 season and gave him a three year contract. No salary terms were disclosed, but it is believed to be around \$50,000 a year.

Gil, a favorite with the New York crowd since joining the Brooklyn Dodgers in 1947, would certainly fit the ticket as a shrewd manager and a top drawing card. The Mets hope Gil will fill the

# 1967 SERIES WRAPUP

The 1967 World Champions are the St. Louis Cardinals. How did they defeat the Boston Red Sox? Let's go back and review some of the series highlights.

Pitcher Bob Gibson led the Cardinals to their series victory by defeating the Red Sox in three of the Cardinal's four victories. His winning scores were 2-1, 6-0, and 7-2. Gibson completed each game he started. He struck out a total of 26 Boston swingers and allowed just 14 hits in 27 innings and the total of 3 runs he allowed gives him a low ERA of 1.00 runs per game. What more can be said of his mastery of the Red Sox? Except that Gibson also added some hitting power as he homered in the seventh game to aid his own cause. Bob Gibson has to be the Most Valuable Player of the Series based on his amazing pitching performance.

Another bright spot on the Cardinals was the flashy Lou Brock who led all batters with a .413 average. He led all hitters with a total of 12 hits including one homer and also scored the highest number of runs — 8. Lou also had a great series on the basepaths as he stole 7 bases including third base in the seventh game. His total of seven thefts is a new series record. Brock has to be considered the best offense player of the series.

Not to be overlooked for St. Louis is Roger Maris who had a fine series batting a hot .385 with a total of 10 hits. Maris broke up Longorg's shutout in the fifth game by homering with two out in the ninth. Julian Javier, the Cards' second baseman, hit at a .360 clip as he also added a home run. Mike Shannon hit a homer as the Cards banged out a total of five for the series.

The Red Sox heroes include Carl Yastrzemski, Dalton Jones, and Jim Lonborg. Leftfielder Yastrzemski not only hit a torrid .400 with 10 hits and three home runs, but played a brilliant defensive game in left field, throwing out runners and making unbelievable catches to save Boston time after time. Carl's total of three home runs led all swingers. Carl, a candidate for the MVP Award in the American League, showed that he is a true "professional" — an all-round baseball player.

Pitcher Jim Lonborg hurtled two complete games for wins as he kept Boston in the series when there was no hope left. Jim allowed just four hits and one run going into the final game. In the seventh game, with just two days' rest, Jim wasn't as sharp as in his first two games. The Cards scored seven runs off Lonborg. Many feel that if he had been properly rested, Jim would have done better. Maybe we'll find out next year if both teams win their respective league flags again.

Boston batters hit a total of eight homers and set a record by hitting three in the fourth inning in the sixth game off Cards' pitcher Hughes. Besides Yastrzemski, Rico Petrocelli (2), Reggie Smith (2), and Jose Santiago (1) each had home runs. Dalton Jones hit a fat .388 with a total of seven hits. His average was second highest on the Boston team.

Both teams had individual stars in each game. Those that stand out in this writer's mind are mentioned above—those other stars are listed below with their final series record. It was a well-played series and most of us had fun rooting for our team. Until next October all we can do is talk about it. Until then\_\_\_\_\_.

THE FRIDAY SPOTLIGHT is focused on the 235th Assault Company, a special armed helicopter gunship company, from Fort Benning, Ga., under the temporary command of Maj. Augustus Sheider, executive officer.

The 235th was initially activated 1 Dec 66 at Ft. Benning as a "Slick Unit" and converted late July into a full gunship company. Supporting units consist of 606th TC and 190th Signal detachments.

Sporting Huey "Charlie" model gunships and one UH-1H chopper, the 235th is capable of supplying continuous mini-gun, 2.75 rocket, and 40mm grenade fire power. Since training began in Dec 66, pilots and crews have become professionals in operating all gun systems.

Incidentally a pair of "Mini's" fires 2000 rounds per minute until the system's cante prevent the firing of one of the mini-gun's. At this time the opposite "Mini" picks up steam to 4000 rounds per min. (Charlie That's Fire Power!)

Major Floyd Ebberhart, the CO, is presently enroute to Viet Nam with the advance party. Major Sheider (XO) states that the 235th's mission will be pre-strike armed helicopter support for American and allied infantry units. This unit is unique in that it is the 2nd such Armed Helicopter Co. in the U.S. Army.

Sick call on the USNS WALKER runs from 0830 hours to 1030 hours. LT R.C. Fuerstner, one of the ship's two naval medical officers, asks that routine sick call cases please come during these hours. BE ON TIME!!

The ship's medical facilities and staff are first rate. Along with LT Fuerstner and the ship's other medical officer, LT N.R. West, there are seven corpsmen and an extremely well equipped hospital which includes a laboratory, operating room and X-ray facilities. The ship's medical staff is able to cope with virtually any medical emergency that might arise, but should the unforeseen happen, this ship is part of an elaborate system which utilizes a computer to coordinate different ships' positions and enable a stricken person to be evacuated to a facility where experienced specialists and necessary equipment are available. There's also a well stocked stockroom containing some of the most modern drugs available.

On the sea-sickness front, LT Fuerstner assures that the worst is over. The best remedy is to take Dramamine at the suggested doses, eat (but don't fill up with water) and get plenty of fresh air.
