## ISRAELI RETALIATION

### EGYPTIAN REFINERY ABLAZE

CAIRO (UPI) Egyptian dispatches said three Soviet warships would arrive here Thursday or Friday on what was officially described as a goodwill visit.

The ruins of Egypt's store of 550,000 tons of oil at Suez City continued to blaze out of control following an Israel bombardment that knocked out 80 per cent of the nation's oil refinery

#### WAR COUNCIL

WASHINGTON (UPI) President Johnson was urged Wednesday to create a council of war on high ranking military men to work on a plan for victory in Vietnam, free of political restraints.

The proposal was made by Rep. Wilson of California. He said the council could include the joint chiefs of staff and rear admirals and generals.

Senate democratic leader Mike Mansfield began a drive to get the United Nations security council to seek a negotiated peace in Vietnam. His resolution was endorsed by 41 senators in both parties.

Communique reaching United Nations headquarters said Egyptian guns fired on an Israeli plane flying the refinery fires and that an exchange of artillery and machinegun burst shattered the truce. The new firing was called minor.

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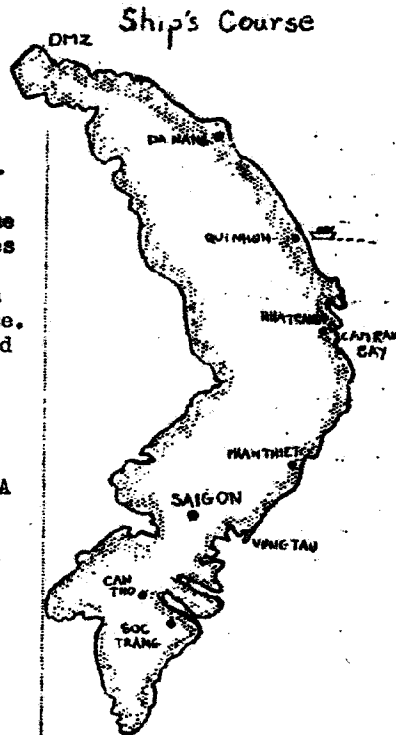
#### WAR OPPOSITION

PRINCETON, N.J. (UPI) A Gallup poll released Wednesday reported there are nearly twice as many Americans opposed to the Vietnam War as there was two years ago. The current poll indicated 46 per cent of the population opposed.

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#### CIVIL RIGHTS BILL

WASHINGTON (UPI) The Senate Judiciary Committee has approved legislation to provide greater federal protection for Negroes and civil rights workers. The bill makes it a federal crime to injure or intimidate Negroes and civil rights workers engaged in legitimate activities.

**SAIGON** U. S. planes swept over Hanoi Wednesday and bombed the Paul Doumer bridge which is one of North Vietnam's most important transportation links. U. S. planes also blasted North Vietnam's biggest big airbase for the second straight day.

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**LIGHT BOLLIG** - West German chancellor Kurt Kiesinger has pledged his government's determination to help Britain enter the European common market. But the way appeared blocked by French President De Gaulle.

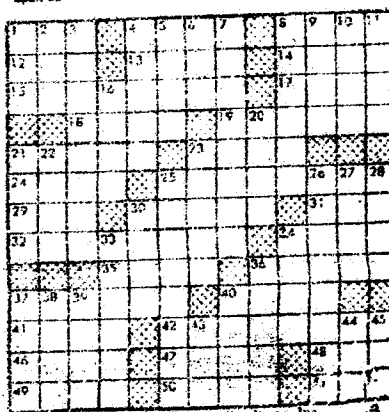

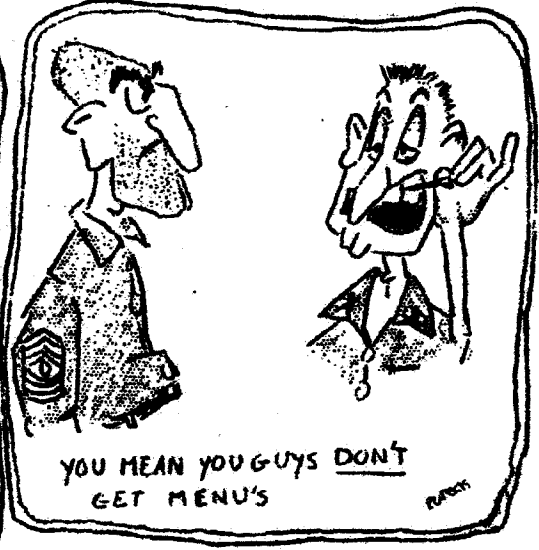

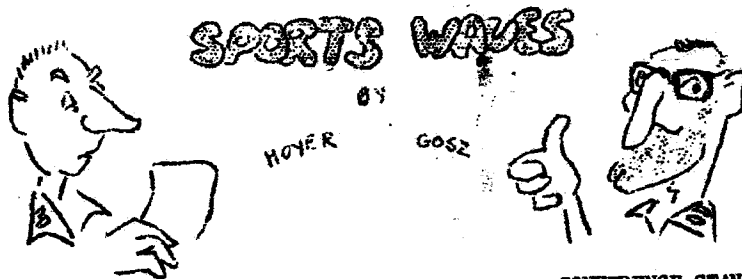

HORLEN INKS '68 CONTRACT

CHICAGO (UPI) Pitcher Joe Horlen Monday became the first player to join the Chicago White Sox fold for 1968 when he signed a contract for a "substantial increase" in salary.

Horlen, a hard-working righthander during the past season, pitched a no-hitter against the Detroit Tigers on Sept. 10, and wound up the campaign leading the American League pitchers with an earned-run average of 2.06.

Horlen, 30, won 19 and lost 7 games in 1967 for a won-lost percentage of .731, tops in the league. He pitched six shutouts and hit his hottest streak in September when he won five consecutive decisions.

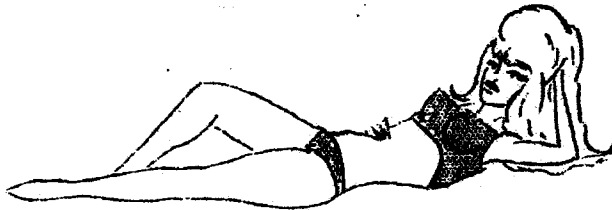

ARMY ACCEPTS L.A.'S CHAMBERS

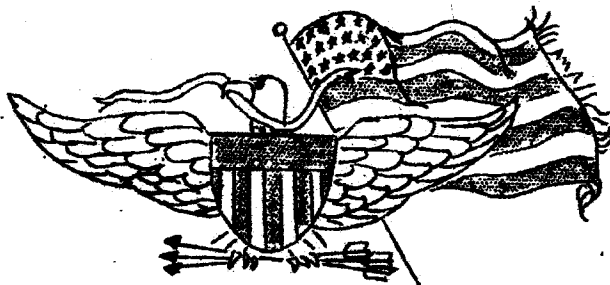
